Plans are under way for information signage and upgrading of existing sites at Kopuaranga and Mauriceville West. The memorial at the Kopuaranga Camp grave site is in need of repair and this will be done in conjunction with the Wairarapa Scandinavian Club. Planning is underway for two new information signs; one at Kopuaranga and the other at the Mauriceville West Reserve. These will provide road information and site plans.

From time to time subscriptions and life membership payments are received through our bank account. Last year payments for a life membership for C. Banks and a subscription for M.A. Bower were received. We have no addresses, so if you know these people would you please get them to contact us?

### **Mauriceville West Reserve:**

The repiling of the school has been completed and continuous galvanised steel spouting will be erected shortly. Access to the building was regarded as substandard and a disability ramp has been erected at the rear door.

96 children from Opaki School recently visited the school, cemeteries and churches with their i-pads for research projects. Feedback was very positive. Thank you to Willy and Julianne Buick, Bill Taylor and Robbie Braddock for the time you gave to encourage these very receptive children to learn about the local history. Mauriceville School is also planning a visit in November. These are the times we remind ourselves that the hard work and commitment of dedicated FOM members is important for future generations.

Over the last two years, locals, Julianne Buick and Barbara Barr have worked extensively on compiling a list of people buried ( as far back as the 1880s ) in the historic 'Public Cemetery' behind the Mauriceville West School, many of which are in unmarked graves. They have used various resources including the Wairarapa Archives, Mac Larsen's research, the Lutheran Church records and information from other people. The list is now as complete as possible and a sign is being prepared with the information on it. This will be erected at the cemetery and the District Council may assist with funding. The completion of the signage will be a great achievement and likewise a great help to descendants of settlers and visitors for many years to come. The existing graves and headstones are tended and cleaned as best they can be.

### **Mauriceville North Norwegian Church:**

A meeting of trustees was held 17.06.14 and since then Headstones Wairarapa have reattached spires on four graves that had turned in the Eketahuna earthquake.

The visitors' book indicates that a lot of people from here and overseas often call in, so we continue to find and display historical information and photographs for their interest.

The church is available for family gatherings, christenings, weddings or other services. It is wonderful to see it used, as it was in August, when there was a dedication service for two children of Norwegian and Swedish descent who were fifth generation descendents of Eli Larsen who is buried there.

After Graham Mitchell, the Norwegian Consul General, visited the church, an invitation was extended to attend a Constitution Day breakfast 16 May at the Norwegian Embassy. After talking to recent immigrants and students studying in Wellington, we became aware that we need to promote our Scandinavian historic places to them and FOM will forward some copies of Kay Flavell's book *Whispering Roads* to the Embassy, to be made available to those who may want to explore the Heritage Trail- Wellington to Napier, via Mauriceville!
